

Māori Data Sovereignty Principles for the Nursing Pre-Registration Pipeline Project

Māori data sovereignty is a fundamental consideration for the Nursing Pre-Registration Pipeline project, with the applications below developed to ensure that Māori are integral to both the kōrero and decision making process around putting in place programmes that would help attract and retain Māori students and later progression/retention of Māori nurses.

In terms of Rangatiratanga and Whakapapa we will ensure that data use is kept consistent with the purposes for which it was collected and assume responsibility for its use beyond our project's intent. Principles and considerations will be published, or a link provided to, with any publicly available information.

Clear messages will be put on any published data about its use giving consideration to these Principles.
Kotahitanga (Collective benefit)	Benefit - Data ecosystems should provide collective benefit	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The original data has been collected from individuals, but currently no information has been supplied by the Tertiary Education Commission (TEC) identifying a student's Iwi affiliations. For the purposes of this project we have presented data at a regional and
